Urging Members to Ensure Safe and Maintainable Suspended Ceilings

Dear Fellow Members

REDAS shares BCA' concerns about the few notable <u>ceiling-related incidents</u> this year – NTU campus (Feb 2022), Nex (Aug 2022), and the latest one at North Coast Lodge dormitory (Sep 2022), which unfortunately saw two individuals suffering minor injuries.

While suspended ceiling is ubiquitous in our buildings and is aesthetically appealing, it is equally crucial that we do not neglect the risk they posed to public safety. <u>Upstream considerations</u> such as the following must be accounted for at design to allow ceilings serve its purpose over its lifespan and reduce its potential safety risk to the public:

- Design & detailing adopting open ceilings or modular ceilings that's easily demountable;
- Access providing adequate access to and within the ceiling for maintenance of services therein;
- 3) <u>Materials</u> adopting ceilings that are weather-resistant and ensuring adequately designed supporting structures that have good resistance to corrosion and deterioration
